Recommendation

It is recommended that your committee review the mid-year report for the Field Trips to State Parks and Beaches Program through the Parks CA 2024 Route to Parks Grant Program.

Discussion

The grant application for the Field Trips to State Parks and Beaches Program was approved at the September 6, 2023, Special Meeting of the Oceano Community Services Board of Directors. In December 2023, the district was awarded \$15,904 for the program. See the attached mid-year report, which is due August 9, 2024.

Other Agency Involvement

The District partners with the Lucia Mar School District, the Oceano Elementary School Parent Teacher Organization, and the San Luis Obispo Beaver Brigade to provide transportation, curriculum, and fingerprinting for chaperones to local state parks and beaches.

Financial Considerations

During the first half of 2024, the program spent \$8,792.84 on 14 trips for 548 participants. In the upcoming school year, the program anticipates 9 trips for 14 different classes at Oceano Elementary School.

Results

Field trips to Oceano Elementary School offer an opportunity to connect students, teachers, staff, and chaperones and provide education about local state parks and beaches.

The Field Trips to State Parks and Beaches Program by Lucia Mar School District, Oceano Elementary School Parent Teach Organization, the Beaver Brigade of San Luis Obispo County and the Oceano Community Services District has provided 14 trips during the period of February to June 2024. So far, 470 students ranging from 1st to 6th grade, 42 chaperones, and 36 staff members have visited 7 different destinations. These destinations include the La Purisima Mission, the Morro Bay Natural History Museum, the Oceano Campground, the Oceano Nature Center, the Oso Flaco State Park, Hearst Castle and the Avila Aquarium.

To California State Parks,

The <u>SLO Beaver Brigade</u> has been educating our county on the benefits of beavers to our watersheds since 2020. We will be offering educational tours to Oceano Public Schools beginning in March 2024. We've attached a site map of our day at Osos Flaco State Park. We would like to meet up at the picnic tables in the parking area of Oso Flaco Lake.

Our curriculum Plan and schedule is:

10:00am - 10:30am : Meet up at the picnic tables in parking area of Oso Flaco Park:

- 1. Wetland Basics:
 - a. What is a wetland
 - b. Why are they important
 - c. How do beavers help wetlands
 - d. Wetland characteristics: full of life, predators and prey!

10:30am - 11:00am Begin Walk along trail towards boardwalk.

1. Game on trail: Mountain Lion - Deer. Instructor will go about 30 feet ahead of the class and pretend he is a deer. The class will pretend they are mountain lions. Whenever the deer looks up and behind him, the mountain lions need to be completely still, otherwise they are out because the deer will see them. The goal is for one of the students/mountain lions to reach the deer without the deer seeing any movement at all.

11:00pm - 12pm Visual Scavenger Hunt along boardwalk

1. Scavenger hunt on the walk. Students will be split up into groups of 5-6 students per group with 1 adult teacher/chaperone. Each will be given a list of wetland related items to spot on the trail as they walk. Once an item is spotted by a student, the teacher/chaperone will confirm and check off of the list.

2. Stop at 2, debrief scavenger hunt.

12pm-12:30pm

1. Eat lunch at picnic tables at area 3, near bathroom facilities.

Would beavers make good firefighters?

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
Abstract

We all know beavers as cute animals with flat tails. They gnaw down trees with their sharp teeth and build dams in rivers. But beavers are much more than lumberjacks. By building those dams, they reshape the whole environment around them and provide their surroundings with more water. And this actually helps the plants around beaver dams to survive during wildfires! Therefore, we can think of beavers not only as great lumberjacks, but also as effective firefighters.

Introduction

Beavers live all across North America and also in Europe and Asia. They are very well known for building dams out of wood. They usually also add stones and mud to build a stable dam. These dams make the rivers flow more slowly. They even keep back enough water that a new pond forms behind the dam.

But beavers do far more to reshape the environment around them. They also dig canals from their ponds out into the surrounding lands. These canals look like tiny rivers and are filled with water from the pond. As a result, even plants that grow a bit farther away from the pond get enough water from the canals (Fig. 1). This makes beavers very important for protecting the environment against **droughts**.



This protects the plants around them from dying even if there is a **drought**, because there is far more water available.

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You can probably imagine that it is harder to burn plants that are healthy and green from drinking enough water. Dry, brown plants burn more easily. So we asked ourselves:

if plants around beaver dams are better **hydrated**, would this be enough to protect them from wildfires?

Methods

To test our theory, we chose five different locations across North America. Wildfires have affected all five places in recent years. All five spots had some parts with beaver territories in them and some parts without beavers.

We looked at satellite images from all five spots. The pictures allowed us to identify the areas where beavers lived, because you can see the beaver dams and their ponds

on the satellite images. So, we had pictures of areas **with** beavers and of areas **without** beavers from five different wildfires.

We then looked at the images from one year before the wildfire started and also at images taken during the wildfire. We compared how green the areas around the beaver dams were to the areas without beaver dams.

Results

According to our theory, areas with beavers should stay greener during wildfires. And we were right! The wildfires burned in both the areas with the beavers and the areas without beavers, but the beaver territories stayed much greener during wildfires (Fig. 2).

We are pretty sure this is because of the beaver dams and canals. The plants there have more water available and therefore don't burn as easily as plants that are less hydrated.

How do we know that beaver dams protect the surrounding area from wildfires?

Discussion

Although it might seem obvious that plants with more water are less likely to burn, our findings are of great importance! We proved that beaver activity can sustain enough water in the environment so that areas are less affected by wildfires. Not only does this mean that more plants survive, but it also creates a **refuge** for animals during wildfires. Not all animals can fly away, swim away, or run fast enough to escape the spreading fires. They can find shelter in the areas around beaver dams, where the fire cannot reach them.

So beaver activity reshapes the environment **and** protects plant and animal life from wildfires. This is something people living in areas that are **prone** to wildfires should keep in mind. Maybe it would be a good idea to introduce beavers into these areas. That way, the beavers would help create fire-resistant spots in the landscapes just by living there!

Conclusion

If you live in an area that is prone to wildfires – or if you know people living in such areas – you could make other people aware of the advantages of beavers. You could talk to your friends, teachers, wildlife organizations, politicians,

or even the public in your town. Tell them that beavers could help them in their wildfire management. This could not only save the lives of plants and animals but also get you a cool firefighting beaver in the neighborhood!

Glossary of Key Terms

Drought – an extended period of dryness, especially when it causes damage to plants.

Hydrated – hydration is the level of water in people, animals, or plants. If you drink enough water every day, you are hydrated.

Prone – being likely, having a tendency.

Refuge – a place where you are safe from whatever danger you are facing. A refuge might be your home if you feel overwhelmed by school or it might even be a whole country that takes you in if you need to flee from your own country.
